Gamelan of Bali...


W.H. Auden (Britten's friend and librettist)

METAMORPHOSES: the poems

- You say this word: Metter-more-FOE-seez
- This is the Latin name
- In English, it means: TRANSFORMATIONS: changing!
- Metamorphoses is a book of poems. There are up to 15 volumes and it contains more than 250 different stories.
- Written by the Roman poet Ovid (43BC 17AD)
- It forms a mythological history of the world (ending with the Roman emperor Julius Caesar) and studies the mysticism of nature.
- The first English translation was published in 1480 by William Caxton. The work influenced Chaucer and Shakespeare, amongst many others.

Benjamin Britten's piece of music Six Metamorphoses after Ovid

The piece of music we're exploring has six parts (called *movements*) and is written for solo oboe.

Each *movement* is based on a character. They are:

- 1. Pan, who played a flute containing Syrinx, the girl he loved.
- **2. Phaeton**, who rode a chariot made of the sun. He was struck by thunder and fell into a river. (3'20)
- **3. Niobe**, a sad mother, who was turned into a mountain! (5'30)
- **4. Bacchus**, who hosted long parties full of song and enjoyment! (8'24)
- 5. Narcissus, who fell in love with his own reflection, and became a flower. (11'27)
- **6. Arethusa** who, trying to avoid love, was turned into a fountain. (15'40)
- Watch the film and hear the music (saved on your computer). Each movement starts at the times shown above.

Our film

We will be creating a response piece (of film and music) exploring Phaeton and Narcissus.

Other activities to explore in the classroom

- Image distortion: Look at your face in the reflection on the back of a spoon. Draw what you see.
- Mirror/ reflections in pairs, copy each others actions.
- Clay/ plasticene create your own 'Morph' characters
- Look at this picture. Explore the similarities and differences of these two versions. How have they been 'transformed'?
